## Community

For nearly 60 years, Warren Consolidated Schools have given residents of the northeast Detroit suburbs of Warren, Sterling Heights, and Troy the finest in educational opportunities for their children. Currently, the district consists of thirteen elementary schools, four middle schools, four high schools, the Career Prep Center (CTE), the School of Performing Arts, and the Macomb Math Science Technology Center. Additionally, students have opportunities to participate in online learning, the Early College of Macomb, and dual enrollment.

## School

Warren Mott is a comprehensive four-year public high school with grades nine through twelve. Warren Mott is accredited by the **North Central Association of Secondary Schools** and is a **Michigan Blue Ribbon Exemplary School**.

## Demographics

The following are estimates for the total student population based on multiple data sources: 54% male, 46% female, 64% free & reduced lunch, <1% Native American, 14% Asian American, 14% African American, <1% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, 69% Caucasian, <1% Hispanic or Latino, 2% Multi-Racial, 45% will attend 2-year colleges, 35% will attend 4-year colleges

## Curriculum

The academic program is organized on a traditional two-semester, six-period schedule. All students are required to remain enrolled in six credits per year and are expected to earn a total of 24 credits. Online learning experiences are embedded within various course curricula. For graduation, a student must earn a minimum of 22.5 credits and meet the requirements below.

- AP® courses are offered in Calculus, Literature & Composition, Language & Composition, Psychology, Biology, Spanish, and Government.
- Honors and Accelerated courses include: Geometry, Algebra 2 & Trigonometry, Pre-Calculus, Chemistry, English 9, and English 10.

## Grading, Ranking, Honor Point

Grade point averages are computed on a 4.0 scale on all subjects taken in the ninth through twelfth grades. Honors, Accelerated, and AP courses are awarded an additional GPA point when the final grade is over 80%. Students are ranked according to grade point average. The following grade points are used in calculations.

Grades of CR (Credit) or NC (No Credit) are not factored into the GPA.
